Australian volunteers have supported partner organisations in Papua New Guinea to achieve their development goals since 1964. The Australian Government's Australian Volunteers Program continues this rich history.

The Australian Volunteers Program develops long-term, mutually respectful partnerships with organisations across the Pacific, Asia, and Africa to contribute to locally led change and the realisation of the Sustainable Development Goals.

The program aims to:

- Support partner organisations to progress their development objectives
- Increase program participants' cultural awareness and build stronger connections across countries

# **Our work in PNG**

Our team in Papua New Guinea works closely with our partners to understand their priorities and objectives. Together with our partners, we identify how the program can support them and how that support might change over time.

The program provides support across a range of development priorities in Papua New Guinea, including:

- Heath
- Education
- IT (
- Infrastructure
- Community and social development

In Papua New Guinea, we partner with organisations working in a broad range of sectors, including government and civil society and health. Program partners are primarily government agencies and local or national NGOs.

Volunteer assignments are with partners in Port Moresby, Goroka, Lae and Buka. The program also supports partners through remote volunteer assignments.

The program facilitates opportunities for partners to connect with each other, exchange knowledge and share experiences. For example, partners participate in online and face-toface workshops that focus on specific sectors or topics such as disability inclusion, gender equality and safeguarding.

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We envision Touching the Untouchables being able to explore, participate in and experience other aspects of community development in Papua New Guinea. # Australian organisations



## Spotlight on the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals

The Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Papua New Guinea is the country's only community-based nonprofit organisation dedicated to animal welfare.

Its mission is to provide sanctuary and care for abandoned and mistreated animals, while providing public outreach and education on animal welfare issues. The organisation identified a need to increase its capacity to effectively market its mission and raise funds to achieve its vision.

Australian volunteer Samantha Eismen joined the society as a Marketing and Fundraising Support Mentor. Her dedication, expertise, and commitment to the cause of animal welfare played an important role in driving positive change within the organisation. She strengthened the marketing and media skills of staff to enable them to improve the organisation's visibility, reputation, and fundraising capabilities. The society is now in a strong position for sustained growth and impact in its mission to advocate for the welfare of animals in Papua New Guinea.

Samantha supported staff to strengthen their skills and handle marketing and media challenges confidently and effectively. The team has since delivered successful fundraising events such as a golf tournament, which attracted a record number of participants and funds.

Samantha encouraged a culture of continuous learning and improvement within the organisation. She also introduced strategies such as leveraging social media platforms for marketing purposes to expand outreach and engagement with a broader audience. The adoption of customer relationship management tools also streamlined communication with sponsors and donors, facilitating better donor stewardship and long-term relationships. Samantha encouraged the organisation to embrace digital tools like Google storage, reducing reliance on paper-based documentation.

The Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Papua New Guinea valued Samantha's contribution and her commitment to adapting to the local culture by learning the language. Her honest feedback facilitated fair communication, and her skills aligned with the organisation's needs.
