## Our work in Sri Lanka

Our team in Sri Lanka works closely with our partners to understand their priorities and objectives. Together with our partners, we identify how the program can support them and how that support might change over time.

The program provides support across a range of development priorities in Sri Lanka, including:

- Economic development and business
- Tourism development
- Gender equality
- Disability inclusion
- Reconciliation

In Sri Lanka, we partner with organisations working in a broad range of sectors, including agriculture, forestry and fisheries, education, and civil society and government. Program partners are mainly local or national NGOs or international agencies.

Volunteer assignments are with partners throughout Sri Lanka, including the capital Colombo. The program also supports partners through remote volunteer assignments.

The program facilitates opportunities for partners to connect with each other, exchange knowledge and share experiences. For example, partners participate in online and face-to-face workshops that focus on specific sectors or topics such as disability inclusion, gender equality and safeguarding.

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As a small NGO, it is very difficult to find resources to fill skills gaps locally. The approach to locally- led development and the friendly nature of the in-country team motivated us to work with the Australian Volunteers Program."

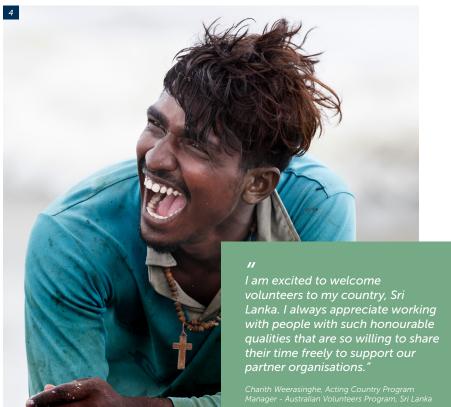
# **Small grants**

Through the Impact Fund, we provide small grants of up to AUD\$10,000 to our partners to support their vital work and progress towards achieving their development objectives.

The Impact Fund has supported over 200 partners to deliver hundreds of projects. Projects have been across a range of thematic areas including gender equality, disability and social inclusion, climate action, organisational strengthening, and COVID-19 response and recovery.

We support existing partnerships between overseas partners and Australian organisations and identify opportunities for new partnerships. Australian partners contribute to skills and knowledge exchange and support volunteer recruitment.

# Spotlight on United Nations Population Fund

United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), a partner of the Australian Volunteers Program since 2018, is the United Nations' sexual and reproductive health agency.

UNFPA is working in Sri Lanka to deliver family planning, prevent maternal deaths and eliminate gender-based violence and harmful practices. The program works with UNFPA in Sri Lanka, supporting work focusing on sexual and reproductive health, gender equality, women empowerment and population dynamics.

Australian volunteer Kate Allio completed two remote volunteering assignments with UNFPA as a Program Associate. She supported the organisation's sexual and reproductive health programs. During her assignments, Kate supported the organisation with the development of their strategic plan for 2022-2025. She also worked with staff to develop the terms of reference for effective evaluation and assisted with external consultations and group discussions on maternal health-related work. Additionally, Kate worked with staff and stakeholders to initiate a review on the impact of COVID-19 on women and girls in Sri Lanka.

Staff appreciated Kate's expertise and collaborative way of working and, despite the challenges of remote volunteering, felt that her skills in evaluation greatly benefitted the organisation's key objectives and planning.
